I. Welcome

EAC Chairman Dr. Jay Allen called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

II. Approval of Minutes

Dr. Allen called for approval of the minutes from the October 22, 2020 meeting. Dr. Harold Fisher moved to approve the minutes as presented. Dr. Felicia Nave seconded the motion. The motion carried.

III. Approval of Agenda

Dr. Allen asked if there were any changes to the agenda. Dr. Harold Fisher moved to approve the agenda as presented. Dr. Carey Wright seconded the motion. The motion carried.

IV. MS Connects – Dr. Carey Wright

Dr. Carey Wright presented a PowerPoint presentation on *Mississippi Connects* initiative, established by the Mississippi Department of Education (MDE). Mississippi Connects is a comprehensive digital learning program providing computers and teaching and learning support to every public-school student in the state.

As part of the Mississippi Connects initiative, MDE delivered laptops/tablets to all districts. They also provided digital curriculum for teaching and learning, connectivity in areas where

students do not have broadband service, professional development for educators, students and parents, and telehealth and teletherapy services.

MDE recently hosted a Mississippi Connects Virtual Summit on digital learning. More than 2,700 educators registered for the summit. Sessions ranged from student engagement to best practices for hybrid and online instruction and learning.

V. Discussion of Attainment Goal

Dr. Allen and Mr. Jim McHale, President and CEO of Woodward Hines Education Foundation, recognized the members of the Education Attainment Goal Taskforce.

At the last meeting, the EAC members approved the postsecondary attainment goal of 55% by 2030 and 60% by 2035 and endorsed the resolution of that goal.

Mr. McHale stated the Education Attainment Taskforce members continue to meet on a regular basis. The taskforce developed a logo that is published on the Woodward Hines landing page.

The taskforce presented the attainment goal to the Mississippi Economic Development Council and plans on presenting Mississippi's goal to the Alliance of Non-Profits and Film Graphic Organizations.

Last fall, taskforce members met with Governor Tate Reeves and Lt. Governor Delbert Hosemann to talk about the education attainment goal for Mississippi.

The taskforce also met on Wednesday, March 24^{th.} At that meeting, they identified funders to help make that goal possible.

Mr. McHale thanked Dr. Casey Prestwood for sharing a study called "It's Complicated, The Relationship between Postsecondary Attainment and State Finances" with the members. He said he reached out to one of the authors, Dr. Elizabeth Davidson Pisacreta, asking her to do a similar study for the state of Mississippi.

Dr. Allen, Mr. McHale, and Dr. Prestwood met with the Governor and Lt. Governor before the legislative session began. They will continue to educate legislators and key players on the attainment goal.

Dr. Shawn Mackey asked which credentials of value will be counted as a part of the attainment goal metrics for Mississippi.

Dr. Prestwood said each state is still looking at defining "credentials of value" because it varies by state and/or by industry or business. The data that has been collected shows the adult population have credentials that they didn't earn in the postsecondary system but are in the workforce.

Dr. Allen mentioned Florida used a credential that provided a wage at a certain percentage above minimum wage that may not be the best option for Mississippi. There is a need to include all types of credentials earned in the postsecondary setting and a need to be able to track that data.

Ms. Audra Dean said it is important to note that individuals can earn multiple credentials of value, degrees, or certificates; however, only the first credential/degree earned is counted as a part of the education attainment goal.

- Secured \$200 million from the Legislature through two laws, the <u>Equity in Distance Learning Act (SB 3044)</u> and the <u>Mississippi Pandemic Response Broadband</u> <u>Availability Act (HB 1788).</u>
- Collaborated with Governor, Lt. Governor, House Speaker and State Auditor to ensure compliance with state and federal funding requirements and successful implementation of the laws.
- Established Mississippi Connects initiative, making Mississippi the **only state in the nation** with a comprehensive digital learning program providing computers and teaching and learning support to every public-school student in the state.

As Schools Go Remote, Finding 'Lost' Students Gets Harder

Even six months into the pandemic, the technology needs among lower-income students cannot be overestimated. In Washington, about 60 percent of the 32,000 families who responded to a survey over the summer said they needed a digital device, and 27 percent said they needed internet access. In Mississippi — which has the highest child poverty rate in the nation, at about 28 percent — Carey M. Wright, the superintendent of education, said the State Legislature had allotted \$200 million to ensure every student has a device this school year. But because of high national demand, some will not receive it until November.


