
Susan Leigh Lofton



Billy Edwin Mink, Jr.


Billy Edwin Mink, Jr., a senior at the University of Mississippi School of Medicine, is president of the Associated Student Body at the Medical Center.






John R. Ates



John David Smith








The Rev. Albert H. Freundt, Jr., D. Min.


Andy Calvert

Andy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roger A. Calvert.




H. Trenton England



Dr. Nancy E. Broom Woods






Archibald Bland Campbell, III


Robert Patrick Jones

Robert is an active member of Woodville Heights Baptist Church in Jackson.




Dr. James V. Burnside



Winfred is a full-time minister for the Center Street Church of Christ in Brookhaven, Mississippi. He is married to the former Linda Faye Alexander and they have two children.




Howard Andrew Cox

Bonita is the youngest daughter of Paulette Powell-Jackson and Willie Fields.




Dr. Abdul K. A. Mohamed






Rodney Hughes




Chris Archie

Marcus Cortez Reeves




